After roll call was taken and it was determined that a quorum was present, Vice Chairman Jenkins called the meeting to order at 10:06 a.m.

#### **OLD BUSINESS:**

The minutes of the May 20, 2021 meeting were approved on a motion made by Mr. Mark Stephens and seconded by Mr. Brian Rosenbalm. Motion carried.

#### **NEW BUSINESS:**

Vice Chairman Jenkins called for the Review of FY 20-23 TIP Spreadsheet and Administrative Modifications. Ms. Messick gave the members a copy of the current TIP. Ms. Messick explained that there were three administrative modifications for the month that created changes on the TIP spreadsheet and one administrative modification that did not create a change on the TIP spreadsheet.

Vice Chairman Jenkins announced an agreement had been made between the City of Anniston and Norfolk Southern for the remaining portions of the Chief Ladiga Trail and should be finalized by the end of the month.

Vice Chairman Jenkins then called for discussion of Resolution No. 822. Ms. Messick explained this resolution is to increase the CN funds for project number 53 (100070228), traffic signal

upgrades at SR-202 and North Hunter Street. This increase was requested by ALDOT and should be the final engineers estimate update as the project is on the July Let list. A motion was made by Mr. Fred Denney to approve this amendment with **Resolution No. 822**, which was seconded by Mr. Mark Stephens. Motion carried.

Vice Chairman Jenkins next called for discussion of Resolution No. 823. Ms. Messick explained this resolution is to support East Alabama Regional Planning and Development Commission (EARPDC) becoming a direct recipient of FTA Section 5307 Funds. Ms. Lori Corley explained EARPDC has applied for the direct recipient ship with the blessing of ALDOT and at the same time as 6 other MPOs in Alabama. Should EARPDC become a direct recipient, the Section 5307 staff and MPO will enter a written agreement outlining each party's responsibilities withing the transportation planning process. A motion was made by Mr. Brian Rosenbalm to approve this amendment with **Resolution No. 823**, which was seconded by Mr. Fred Denney. Motion carried.

Vice Chairman Jenkins next called for discussion CAC Appointments. Ms. Messick reported that there was a list of the members in the agenda packet to review. The City of Anniston still needs 8 appointments, 2 for the City of Jacksonville, 7 for the City of Oxford, and 1 for the City of Weaver. The CAC meeting the month prior had a good showing and they are eager to re-start their membership subcommittee to assist municipality mayors in appointing new members.

Next, Vice Chairman Jenkins continued with New Business by calling for discussion of Safety Observations. Ms. Messick explained that there was a handout in the agenda packet with the list of concerns from the CAC that had been discussed at previous meetings for review. There was one item that had been updated which was for the South Quintard/W Greenbriar signaling causing some traffic stacking.

#### **OTHER BUSINESS:**

Vice Chairman Jenkins called for the status report on other local projects from ALDOT East Central Division. Mr. Shane Brown had sent a report for the current construction projects. This report detailed the AL-144 resurfacing and safety widening has completed the permanent stripe and is awaiting completion of punch list items. US-431 access management has completed turn lanes and U-turn bulbs through the upper binder along the north and south bound and is in process of median crossover removal and turn lane construction. For Baltzell and Lenlock, the existing concrete islands have been removed, pipe and inlets have been installed, and construction of signal foundations is in progress. For Church Ave. resurfacing, pipe has been installed and construction on the inlet, ramps, and sidewalk is in progress. Oxford's 78 access management should be complete in the next 2-3 weeks and the resurfacing will begin in Coldwater at the 202 intersection throughout the 2 lane first.

Vice Chairman Jenkins called for the Report on Urban Fixed Route and ADA Handicapped Transit Systems. Ms. Messick gave the report for the Fixed-Route ridership for the month of May, which was provided in the agenda packet for review. Ms. Messick explained the ADA Paratransit Ridership for Anniston had 616 (decrease) one-way trips, Jacksonville had 99 (decrease) one-way

trips, 40 trips for Weaver (decrease), and Oxford had 166 (decrease) one-way trips. For the Urbanized area 149 (increase) one-way trips and 135 (decrease) one-way trips for the Rural area. Fixed-route ridership had a total of 6,498 (increase) riders for the month of May.

Chairman Clendenning next called for discussion of the Local Roads Safety Initiative. Ms. Messick explained this initiative was replacing the High Risk Rural Roads for this fiscal year. It is open to cities and counties in rural and urban non-state maintained/local roadways that have significant safety risks. Sponsors may submit more than one application. The split for this program is 90/10. Projects can not have right-of-way and utilities will only be considered if let through state services. Project plans must have authorization prior to May 1, 2022 and there is no maximum amount for the federal funding.

Finally, Vice Chairman Jenkins called for comments or issues from member jurisdictions or attendees. There were none.

There being no further business, a motion was made by Mr. Mark Stephens and seconded by Mr. Brian Rosenbalm to adjourn. The meeting was adjourned at 10:19 am. The next meeting of the MPO will be Thursday, July 14, 2021 at 10:00 a.m.
