The meeting was called to order at 10:04 a.m. by Ms. Libby Messick.

Upon reviewing the minutes of the January 13, 2021 meeting, a motion to approve the minutes was made by Mr. Toby Bennington and was seconded by Mr. Mark Stephens. Motion carried.

OLD BUSINESS:

There was no old business items to discuss.

NEW BUSINESS:

Ms. Messick called for review of the FY 20-23 TIP Spreadsheet and Administrative Modifications. She gave the members handouts of the list of MPO projects. Ms. Messick explained that there were six modifications that created changes to the TIP spreadsheet and two modifications that did not create any changes.

Next, Ms. Messick called for called for discussion of Resolution No. 812. Ms. Messick explained this resolution was a correction to the Resolution that was passed the previous month to cover an increase in PE for Hillyer Robinson Industrial Parkway Safety Improvements. The overrun amount reported on the previous Resolution was of \$12,167.04 and should have been \$22,512.10. A motion was made by Mr. Mark Stephens to approve this increase with Resolution No. 812, which was seconded by Mr. Toby Bennington. Motion carried.

Ms. Messick next called for discussion of Resolution No. 815. Ms. Messick explained this resolution was to increase the CN funds for project number 56 (100070198) Resurfacing on Henry Road and Country Club Drive SW to Fairway Drive. Whereas a Resolution was passed the previous month to reduce the limits of the project, an updated engineer's report found that additional funding would be needed to complete the project. A rough estimate between the additional funding needed from the engineering report and remaining funds from the Church Street project in the amount of \$165,000 was

projected to be needed for this project. A motion was made by Mr. Fred Denney to approve this increase with Resolution No. 815, which was seconded by Mr. Mark Stephens. Motion carried.

Ms. Messick then called for discussion of Resolution No. 816. Ms. Messick explained this resolution was to increase CN funds for project number 44 (100064897) Installation of a Roundabout at the Bynum Leatherwood Road (CR-109) and Old Gadsden Highway Intersection. She further explained that this project is scheduled for let next month. A motion was made by Mr. Fred Denney to approve this increase with Resolution No. 816, which was seconded by Mr. Toby Bennington. Motion carried.

Ms. Messick next called for discussion of Status Report of ALDOT projects. Ms. Messick explained she had received a phone call from Shane Brown prior to the meeting stating he would not be in attendance and there were no further updates from what was given last month.

Next, Ms. Messick continued by calling for discussion of Safety Observations. She explained that there was a handout in the agenda packet with the list of concerns from the CAC that had been discussed at previous meetings for review. There were no new updates at this time.

Next, Ms. Messick called for the Report on Urban Fixed Route and ADA Handicapped Transit Systems. Ms. Messick explained she had not received this data yet, but it may be provided before the MPO meeting the following week.

Ms. Messick reminded those in attendance about the meeting with ALDOT finance and each municipality finance after next month's TAC meeting, March 10, 2021.

The next TAC meeting will be Wednesday, March 10, 2021 at 10:00 a.m.

WHEREAS, amended Title 23 USC 217 (SAFETEA-LU, Section 6001; MAP-21, 2012; FAST Act, 2015), 23 CFR 450.200 and 450.300, require the State of Alabama and Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) to accommodate the needs to non-motorists in the transportation planning process as well as integrate walking and bicycling facilities and intermodal programs into transportation plans, and

WHEREAS, the Calhoun Area MPO has adopted its 2019 Calhoun Area Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan on August 15, 2019, and

WHEREAS, the Calhoun Area MPO wishes to amend the 2019 Calhoun Area Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan to include recognition and record of an economic impact study as

Appendix D - Trail Economic Impacts in Calhoun County

"As a new and added component to the Calhoun MPO Bicycle Pedestrian Plan, recently updated substantially, is the inclusion of measuring the value of economic impact to the development and sustainability of non-motorized street transportation, recreational trail use and the connectivity to ecotourism and the overall economic development environment and quality of life. A program along with a methodology to measure this component has been well planned and well outlined to guide and support decisions for public and private sector investment.

Beginning in March 2021, Jacksonville State University's Center for Economic Development and Business Research (CEDBR) in collaboration with JSU's School of Science Masters GIS Program, will begin a new evaluation of the economic impact that the recreational bike/ped trails in Calhoun County have on our local economy. JSU's CEDBR has had trail counters on the Chief Ladiga Trail and Coldwater Mountain Bike Trail for close to three years. They added trail counters to the most recently developed McClellan Trails in February of 2020. These trail counters collect raw usage data throughout the year. By pairing this raw data collected from the trail counters in conjunction with intercept surveys that JSU students will be collecting throughout a seven-month time frame at different points along each trail, they will be able to formulate an accurate economic impact these essential trails have on Calhoun County and the local region's economy. The data used for this study will be collected from March 2021 through October 2021.

The importance of an all-encompassing bicycle and pedestrian plan to include the economics of use, expansion and impact ensures that component becomes and stays a vital and necessary link to a city's and to a region's overall transportation plan."

Results of the above study will subsequently be added to the plan when completed.

INTERPRETING THE RESULTS:

Construction economic impacts are realized only during the time of construction. That is why they are considered short-term impacts. Construction sometimes necessitates workers from outside the county coming in to work, needing lodging (lodging tax), needing food and supplies while on the job (sales tax).

These impacts are estimated for Calhoun County, Alabama. All dollars are stated in FY 2022 dollar values which is the fiscal year the expansion is estimated to be completed.

As an example, the following is an explanation of the Construction Impact.

We see a total impact of 35 jobs, \$1,448,309 in Labor Income, \$1,958,396 in Value Added, and \$4.5M in Output. This is the total economic impact from the estimated construction of the Chief Ladiga Expansion estimated to be finished in FY 2022, the sum of the Direct, Indirect, and Induced effects. Each of the next sections outlines what each part of this impact means.

DIRECT EMPLOYMENT

The 26 Direct Employment positions that is estimated to be required to complete the construction.

INDIRECT EMPLOYMENT

The selected contractor to complete the construction has to purchase construction supplies and possibly buy/lease equipment. Because the business is able to purchase some of its inputs from within the county, 5 jobs are supported in business-to-business transactions with the construction material supply chain industries, as well as suppliers of those suppliers in the state.

INDUCED EMPLOYMENT

The construction company employees and the indirect impact employees spend a lot of their take-home income in Calhoun county on things like paying rent and buying groceries. Through this, 4 jobs are supported in industries like real estate, health care and restaurants.

DIRECT LABOR INCOME

The \$1.4M in Direct Labor Income is the sum of the Employee Compensation and Proprietor Income paid to those 26 direct employees.

INDIRECT LABOR INCOME

The \$230,483 in Indirect Labor Income is the employee compensation and proprietor income that the facility supports in the construction contractor suppliers. Indirect Labor Income is the amount of the employee compensation and proprietor income that is associated with business-to-business transactions as a result of the economic activity generated by the Event.

INDUCED LABOR INCOME

Because the construction contractor and the other supported workers are spending their paychecks around the county, there is an Induced Labor Income of \$151,189, including Employee Compensation and Proprietor Income. Induced Labor Income is the amount of employee compensation and proprietor income that is associated with household spending as a result of the economic activity generated by the Event.

DIRECT VALUE ADDED

Value Added is akin to Gross Domestic Product (GDP) or at the county/state level, Gross State Product (GSP). Value Added includes the Labor Income dollars, as well as Taxes on Production and Imports (TOPI) and Other Property Income (OPI). The contracted companies involved constructing the expansion will contribute approximately \$2M in Direct Value Added.

INDIRECT VALUE ADDED

Through the business-to-business transactions, the construction supply chain businesses will contribute \$426,212 to Value Added or GSP. This is the specific Value Added that is generated by business-to-business transactions because of the economic activity generated by the construction of the trail expansion.

INDUCED VALUE ADDED

Because of the spending of the direct and indirect employees, \$298,483 of Value Added is supported. This is the specific Value Added that is generated from household spending as a result of the economic activity generated by the by the construction of the trail expansion.

DIRECT OUTPUT

The construction of the Chief Ladiga Trail expansion has a Direct Output of \$4.5M. Output is equal to Value Added plus Intermediate Expenditures; it is the total value of production (service).


INDIRECT OUTPUT

Because of the business-to-business transactions resulting from local input purchases by the construction contractor, \$881,722 in Output is supported. Indirect Output represents all of the Output generated because of the Direct business to business spending.

INDUCED OUTPUT

Finally, \$536,792 of Induced Output is supported when the direct and indirect employees spend their money throughout the economy. Induced Output is the total value that all industries take in because of household spending.

Resolution #818

Amending the Fiscal Year 2021 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP)

WHEREAS, the Calhoun Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) is the organization designated by the Governor of the State of Alabama as being responsible, together with the State of Alabama, for implementing the applicable provisions of 23 USC 134 and 135 (amended by the FAST Act, Sections 1201 and 1202, December 2015); 42 USC 2000d-1, 7401; 23 CFR 450 and 500; 40 CFR 51 and 93; and,

WHEREAS, the US Department of Transportation (USDOT) requires all urbanized areas, as established by the US Bureau of the Census, to do area-wide urban transportation planning, and the designated planning organization to submit a Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) as a condition for meeting the provisions of Title 23 USC 134; and,

WHEREAS, consistent with the declaration of these provisions, the East Alabama Regional Planning and Development Commission, as staff to the MPO, in cooperation with the Bureau of Transportation Planning and Modal Programs, Alabama Department of Transportation, has prepared a Unified Planning Work Program for Fiscal Year 2021; and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to its duties, functions, and responsibilities, the Calhoun Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) proposes to allocate the remaining administrative funds from fiscal year 2020 in the amount of \$160,680 (\$128,544 Federal; \$32,136 local match) into fiscal year 2021 in order to complete the Anniston Area Bike-Ped Facility Design/Installation Manual that was allocated funds from 2019 rollover, as well as set some funds aside to identify and implement special studies or set aside for larger plans such as the Long Range Transportation Plan; now,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Calhoun Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO), that the fiscal year 2020 UPWP be amended as indicated above.

WHEREAS, consistent with the declaration of these provisions, the East Alabama Regional Planning and Development Commission, as staff to the MPO, has drafted a letter of disagreement with the Metropolitan and Micropolitan Statistical Area Review Committees recommendation to the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) to denote urban areas as those with a population of 100,000 whereas current urban areas are denoted with a population of 50,000.

To Whom It May Concern:

We of the Calhoun Area (Anniston) MPO disagree with the subject changes and offer the following comments to the OMB in regards to changes to OMBs metropolitan and micropolitan statistical area standards.

The recommendations state: "These areas are not designed to serve as a general-purpose geographic framework applicable for nonstatistical activities or for use in program funding formulas" when they are used for urbanized funding and Community Development Block Grant Funding (CDBG). The Urbanized Area Formula Program (49 U.S.C. Chapter 53, Sections 5307 & 5340 as reauthorized under the FAST Act) makes federal resources available to urbanized areas and to governors for transit capital and operating assistance, and for transportation related planning in urbanized areas. The CDBG program provides annual grants on a formula basis to entitled cities and counties to develop viable urban communities. Eligible grantees for this program include: Principal cities of Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs), other metropolitan cities with populations of at least 50,000, and qualified urban counties with populations of at least 200,000 (excluding the population of entitled cities).

The Calhoun Area (Anniston) Alabama MPO is just 1 out of 7 MPOs in the state of Alabama that will be affected. From the standpoint of Urbanized Area Formula Program and CDBG, these recommendations have a disproportionately negative impact on minority and low income populations and they would strip an estimated 2.7 million minorities representation in the transportation planning process. Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) were introduced in the Federal-Aid Highway Act of 1962 in order to ensure regional cooperation in transportation planning. We should be moving forwards, not backwards.
