

After roll call was taken and it was determined that a quorum was present, Chairman, Councilman Jerry Parris called the meeting to order at 10:05 a.m.

Ms. Lori Hodge Corley introduced herself to the members present. Ms. Corley is the new Executive Director for East Alabama Commission.

OLD BUSINESS:

The minutes of the June 21, 2018 meeting were approved on a motion made by Mr. Fred Denney and seconded by Mr. Jay Jenkins. Motion carried.

NEW BUSINESS:

Chairman Parris called for the Review of FY 16-19 TIP Spreadsheet and Administrative Modifications. Ms. Libby Messick gave the members a copy of the current TIP and also a list of the ALDoT modifications for this month and briefly reviewed it with them.

Next, Chairman Parris called for discussion of Resolution No. 765. Ms. Messick gave the members a copy of the full UPWP for review and explained that this resolution will adopt the final FY 2019 UPWP. A motion was made by Mr. Jay Jenkins to approve the adoption with **Resolution No. 765**, which was seconded by Mr. Fred Denney. Motion carried.

Chairman Parris continued by calling for the discussion of CAC Appointments. Ms. Messick explained that there was a list of the members in the agenda packet to review. The City of Anniston still needs 6 appointments, 4 for the City of Oxford, 1 Trucking Representative, 1 for the Anniston Army Depot, 1 for the Town of Hobson City, and 1 for the ALDoT Local Transportation Bureau.

OTHER BUSINESS:

Chairman Parris called for the status report on other local projects from ALDoT East Central Division. Ms. Messick explained that a copy of the local sponsored projects was provided in the agenda packet for review.

Ms. Messick gave the report for the Fixed-Route ridership for the month of July, which was provided in the agenda packet for review. There were 8,820 passengers on the Fixed-Route during July. The final table in the agenda is the ADA Paratransit ridership for the month of July. There were 890 trips for the City of Anniston, 228 trips for the City of Jacksonville, 24 trips for the City of Weaver, 198 trips for the City of Oxford, 284 trips for the Urbanized part of the County and 236 trips for the Rural part of the County.

Chairman Parris called for comments or issues from member jurisdictions or attendees and there were none at this time.

Next meeting of the MPO will be Thursday, September 20, 2018 at 10:00 a.m.

There being no further business, Chairman Parris adjourned the meeting at 10:20 a.m.

WHEREAS, federal regulations require that the Metropolitan Transportation Plans and Transportation Improvement Programs include Bridge and Pavement Performance Measurement (PM2) Targets for urbanized areas and;

WHEREAS, the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) of the Calhoun Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) in coordination with the Federal Highway Administration and the Alabama Department of Transportation (ALDOT) has reviewed the requirement to adopt Bridge and Pavement Performance Measurement (PM2) Targets for use in the transportation process as required by 23 CFR 490.105;

WHEREAS, the TCC Committee at its September 12, 2018 meeting recommended that the Calhoun Area MPO adopt and support the Statewide Bridge and Pavement Performance Measurement (PM2) Targets approved by the ALDOT:





Percent of Person-Miles Traveled on the Non-Interstate NHS That Are Reliable








